## 4-H Trashion Show

The contest is open to any Intermediate or Senior-level 4-H member who has a desire to turn trash into fashion, to create fun wearable garments from discarded material, and to recycle and repurpose "junk" into fabulous and fantastic fashion. Entrants are encouraged to let their imaginations go, be

wildly inventive, and to "think outside of the recycle bin." 4-H member/teams will submit a video application to YouTube by the April 1, 2016, deadline. A team of judges will evaluate the entries, and the top 10 entries will be asked to compete in the Trashion Show Invitational event. The teams chosen will go

## Duds to Dazzle—Clothing (Recycling) Project

4-H members form teams of three to five members. Teams will be assigned one of the following categories: Wearable, Accessory/Jewelry, or Non-wearable. Teams will use the item(s) provided along with any supply closet items to design and create a unique product. Each team will have 60 minutes to complete their finished product. While teams do not select their category beforehand, they can still prepare for the competition. Ample preparation will give them confidence and the skills to help them do their best. Preparation can include having practice

challenges, studying contest resources and the design process, learning how to care for textiles, becoming knowledgeable on safety precautions to utilize while sewing and crafting, learning about consumer purchasing trends and different venues, and gaining knowledge on how to price and market merchandise for a target audience.

In addition to designing and constructing an item, team members must provide a 5 minute presentation to a panel of judges. At least three team members must have speaking roles in the presentation. Judges

may also ask questions of the team members. Reviewing the score card for Duds to Dazzle will help 4-H members prepare for the presentation and question-and-answer segment of the judging process.

Contact Karen DeZarn if you are interested in participating in this project. After School dates can be scheduled. Project leaders are needed as well. The county deadline to register for grades 3-12 is March 22nd and the district contest is April 7 in Coleman.

## 2016 Photography Rules & Guidelines

The 2016 Texas 4-H Photography Rules and Guidelines are now available online. The categories have remained the same for the 2016 contest; however, some of the descriptions have been updated to address questions pertaining to what is allowable in each of the categories. The optional theme category for 2016 is: 4-H, Ribbons, Awards & Recognition.

The theme will focus on Still Life arrangements of 4-H Awards & ribbons. The arrangement and position of the item will be strongly evaluated as well as the quality of the photo. Photo should create emotion.

The County contest for Jr. & Intermediate requires the 8 by 10 photos to be mounted on foam board backing which the office can supply. District deadline to turn in photos is March 16-18.

Besides entering photos in the 4-H photography contest there is an option for youth (Intermediate or Senior) to take part in a judging contest. It is an invitational contest so there is not elimination. It will take part on Tuesday, June 9 as

## Texas 4-H Roundup

Texas 4-H Roundup is a qualifying and invitational event for youth between the ages of 11 and 18 that have successfully placed in a qualifying event at the district level or signed up to compete in an invitational event at the state level. County and district Roundup's are open to all ages of 4-H members from 9 to 18. Texas 4-H Roundup includes approximate-

ly 50 different contests and workshops that test 4-H members on life skills in such attributes are decision making, public speaking, organization, and working with others. These contests include such things as Fashion Show, Food Show, an assortment of judging contests, and educational presentations. The 2016 Texas 4-H Roundup will be held in College Station, Texas on

the campus of Texas A&M University from June 6th to June 10th, 2016. <http://texas4-h.tamu.edu/roundup>

The qualifying event is the District 7 4H Roundup to be held on May 7 at the West Texas Training Center in San Angelo. The county deadline for submission is April 15<sup>th</sup> so be getting ready.

## 2016 Horse Validation

Open on 4-H Connect  
March 1 through May 1.

- March 1 – April 15 - \$10 per horse
- April 16 – May 1 - \$20 per horse

Horses must be **owned** and **validated** by the 4-H mem-

ber, their parents, grandparents, legal guardian, or sibling by **May 1<sup>st</sup>** of each year. A horse that has been validated before must be re-validated (and paid) each year, if it is to be shown.

The validation of multiple

horses is encouraged, so the 4-H member has options, in case of an unforeseen accident, injury, or death of one of the horses.

## Recipe Rally

In the 4-H Recipe Rally, intermediate and senior 4-H members are challenged with selecting, creating, and/or altering a recipe and submitting a video, via YouTube. The video should highlight the 4-H member demonstrating the prepa-

ration of the recipe while also highlighting nutrients; food safety practices, serving size and cost analysis, as well as their inspiration for selection or creation of the recipe. The theme for the 2016 contest is "Picnic Perfect" Information

The Texas 4-H Roundup Guide provides the updated categories and detailed rules related to each category. Educational presentations can be presented in subjects, such as beef, food & nutrition, clothing & textiles, companion animal, shooting sports, and family life, to name just a few. There is also one category that is called "open" or all those other cool projects 4-H members are doing on their own. The district roundup in San Angelo is May 7 at West Texas Training Center and the state 4-H Roundup in College Station is June 6-10. County Agent, Karen DeZarn has printed material, a PowerPoint, and a VCR video describing demon-

strations/educational presentations and talks.

The 2016 Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo Scholarship Applications went live November 4th.

I am sending this information on behalf of Lampasas County Area Go Texan and the "Area Go Texan Scholarship" however there are several types of scholarships that OUR Lampasas County students can apply for as well...

Please look at the new SAT guidelines and minimum test scores that apply to the different types of applications... The Area Go Texan requirement is 950 minimum score with the Math and Verbal scores only!! Yes, they have changed, only using two of the scores and they do not have to come

from the same test. Student's BEST score in each category will be used...

When students apply, they will "check boxes" for all of the types that they are applying for (ex: AGT, Military, Exhibitor) but the student can only win one scholarship...

Something new... There are 2 scholarships that allow home schooled students to apply...

Exhibitor & 4-H.

Feel free to call me for a visit about all the new changes and I'll gladly drop off printed materials as well...

I will come talk with your students and/or parents, during or after school, about our HLSR & County scholarship and the general idea and importance of scholarships and

their future as young adults if you would like... I will also do this in smaller groups if there is a need...

# Texas 4-H Recipe Rally



In the Recipe Rally, 4-H members are challenged with selecting, creating and/or altering a recipe and submitting a video of them demonstrating the preparation of the recipe. Recipes should be a dish that tie to the theme “*Picnic Perfect*.”

## Guidelines - Video Submission

- The rally is open to any intermediate and senior 4-H member.
- Entries can be individual or in a team of two.
- The theme for 2016 is “*Picnic Perfect*.” Recipes selected for entry should be a dish that ties to this theme.
- There are no limitations on the type of recipe submitted. They can be for a main dish, side, snack, dessert, etc. – as long as it ties to the theme.
- All videos submitted will compete against each other for selection to be a part of cooking demonstrations at Texas 4-H Roundup.
- Videos must be submitted by uploading to YouTube by the designated deadline. The direct link to the video must be provided when the 4-H member completes the online entry form.
- Instructions on uploading a video to YouTube are available on the 4-H Roundup page of the Texas 4-H website.
- Videos should be no longer than eight (8) minutes.
- Due to the time limit of the video submission, some food items may be prepared ahead of time (for example, chop onions ahead of time and have them ready for video demonstration).
- 4-H members may only enter a video one time. Multiple video submissions will not be accepted.
- The deadline for all online entries is **April 1, 2016**.
- Youth will be notified of their selection by May 1, 2016.

## Judging Criteria

During the video demonstration, 4-H members should display their public speaking abilities and ability to present and provide a demonstration in front of an audience/camera. Youth may also want to highlight:

- Key steps in preparation of the recipe
- Key nutrients found in dish and their functions
- Food safety practices (*This is especially important with a “picnic perfect” theme.*)
- Substitutions made, or that could be made, to make recipe healthier
- Serving size and cost analysis

Upon review of the video entries, **four finalists** will be selected to be a part of the cooking demonstrations at Texas 4-H Roundup!

## Texas 4-H Roundup – Cooking Demonstrations

- If selected to provide a demonstration at the trade show of Texas 4-H Roundup, youth will conduct a live demonstration of the recipe they prepared in the video submission.
- The cooking demonstration at Texas 4-H Roundup will be held at **5:30 pm on Thursday, June 9, 2016** at the trade show (on the concourse of Reed Arena). Please note that there may be slight changes in the schedule due to 4-H Roundup scheduling and facility needs.
- Participants will need to be available by 3:00 pm on Thursday, June 9th at 4-H Roundup, to work on preparation of the afternoon program.
- Participants may be asked to bring some cooking supplies for the demonstration; however, all ingredients will be provided.
- Participants selected for the cooking demonstrations are required to register for Texas 4-H Roundup and pay all associated registration fees.

**Please note:** Youth selected to come to 4-H Roundup will not be competing for placing and awards. Instead, they are being given the opportunity to be a part of a statewide leadership and educational program by providing a cooking demonstration to Roundup participants as they experience the trade show.

## Eli's Fund

A Memorial for  
Lance Corporal  
Colton Rusk and  
Eli, his service dog



November 2015 – June 2016

Eli, a bomb-sniffing military working dog was assigned to US Lance Cpl. Colton Rusk. In December, 2010, Lance Cpl. Rusk was killed by sniper fire in Afghanistan. Eli, ever faithful to his handler was left depressed and alone. He would not leave Lance Cpl. Rusk's cot at the base for several weeks. In February 2011 Lance Cpl. Rusk's family in South Texas was allowed to adopt Eli. The Texas Veterinary Medical Foundation (College of Veterinary Medicine, CVM) has pledged to cover all of Eli's veterinary care for the rest of his life. The CVM established Eli's Fund as a source of financial support for active duty service men and women, medically retired veterans' service animals and retired military animals.

**Goal: \$15,000**
